GETTING TO KNOW A NOVEL

When you first begin a novel, you usually know nothing about it. The world of the novel is filled with people you have never met and places you have never been. An author must introduce you to that world and make you want to stay in it for a long time.

The first few pages of a novel often contain a lot of **exposition**. Exposition is information that helps you understand where you are in a story and who are the characters you are reading about. It is the background information you need to know in order to understand the characters, situations, and/or settings in the novel.
