mise en place (pronounced *MEEZ en plas*) — French for "put in place"; in cooking, this term refers to the organizing and arranging of ingredients and equipment prior to cooking

Aunt Edna's Brownies

Ingredients

l cup sugar	$\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
$\frac{1}{3}$ cup melted butter	$\frac{3}{4}$ cup flour

2 large eggs $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cocoa powder

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. In a large bowl, stir together the first three ingredients until well combined.
- **3.** Add salt, flour, and cocoa powder to the egg mixture. Stir lightly.
- **4.** Pour batter into a lightly greased 8" × 8" pan. Use a rubber spatula to smooth the mixture.
- **5.** Bake for 20-25 minutes. Let cool before slicing.

- 11. Accept reasonable responses. The best example of hyperbole in Source 3 might be the statement, "It was the worst thing anyone has ever eaten." Students should explain that this is hyperbole because it is a greatly exaggerated claim. As bad as the brownies were, they could not have been the worst thing that has ever been eaten in the history of mankind.
- 12. Dee's brownies were awful because she used way too much salt. The recipe in Source 1 calls for $\frac{1}{4}$ of a teaspoon of salt, but in Dee's *mise en place* (Source 4), we can see that she used $\frac{1}{4}$ of a cup of salt. This may explain why they tasted like "sweaty gym socks dipped in chocolate."
- 13. Accept appropriate responses. Students should draw the ingredients and the equipment needed to make a breakfast food. For example, if the chosen food was cereal, students might draw a cereal box, milk, a bowl, and a spoon.

- 12. A. Electoral. B. Popular. You can tell this is true because the pie chart on the left shows a section (labeled Lincoln) that is larger than half of the pie. The only number in the Source 4 chart that is over 50% is Lincoln's electoral vote (59.4%). Also, Douglas had a much larger percentage of the popular vote than he did of the electoral vote. His section is much larger in the circle on the right.
- 13. Accept reasonable responses. A student might say that Lincoln's beard did help him win because it set him apart from the other candidates, none of whom had beards, judging from the pictures in Source 4. However, it would be more accurate to say that there is not enough information provided to make the determination that Lincoln's beard had anything to do with the election results. In fact, his beard would have been nowhere near fully grown on November 6, the day of the election.

From Source 4, we know the meaning of the term "golden birthday," which tells us that Eve is turning 13 on the 13th. Students might also mention that Eve's e-mail address contains the number "31313", which could stand for her birth date (3/13/13).
