# **World War II Submarines**

America entered World War II after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. Since the attack was a complete surprise, it destroyed most of the American warships there.

Japan is an island in the Pacific Ocean. It has few natural resources. All of its fuel came by ship. So did all the materials needed to build planes, ships, and submarines for the war.


Of course, Americans did not want the Japanese to get fuel or supplies. Yet for the first months of the war, the U.S. only had submarines that were able to fight. So the subs were sent to sink the ships carrying goods to Japan. They did an amazing job. Even though subs had less than 2% of the Navy's **manpower**, they caused more than half of Japan's shipping losses: 5.3 million tons of materials and fuel.

U.S. subs also gathered information. Later in the war, they rescued American pilots who had their planes shot down over the ocean. The first President George Bush was one of the Navy pilots saved in this way.

Life on a submarine was not easy. The air was stuffy. It was crowded. There was no place to be alone. In the main aisle of the sub, each man had to frequently pause while someone squeezed past. Each person's bunk was barely big enough to lie down on. Serving on a sub was scary, too. If an enemy discovered a sub, the sailors had to shut down its engines and hope that the depth charges fired on them would miss.

Due to the many hardships, everyone on a sub was a volunteer. Before going down, these men had to pass a lot of physical and mental testing. They had to convince doctors that they wouldn't crack under the pressure of being thousands of feet below water with no chance for escape or rescue.

Many men on subs lost their lives in World War II. More than 3,600 Americans lie in watery graves where their submarines sank.


