

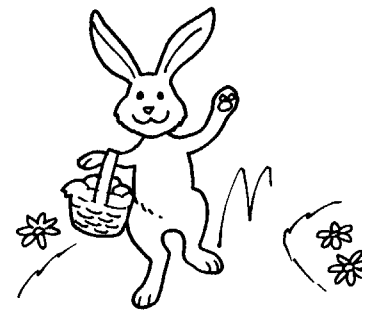
Easter Bunny Math

Six Easter bunnies distributed 10,000 Easter eggs to 500 children on Easter morning. Read the information below, then complete the table below and answer the questions at the bottom of the page.

Clues:

1. Peter Rabbit delivered the largest percent of the eggs. He delivered 3000 eggs.
2. Flopsy and Funny Bunny delivered the same number of eggs; their combined total was the same as Peter Rabbit’s total.
3. The Velveteen Rabbit delivered the least amount of eggs, only $\frac{1}{20}$ of the total. This was half the amount distributed by Mopsy.
4. Cottontail delivered the second highest amount of eggs.

2. Each rabbit delivered eggs to a certain number of children. Beside the name of each rabbit, write the number of children to whom she/he delivered eggs.

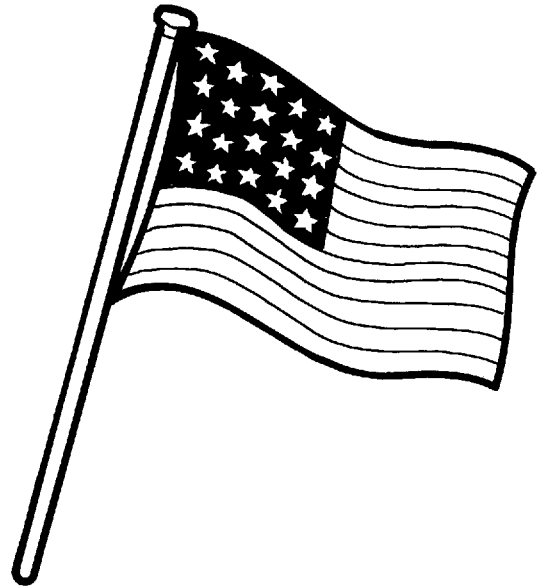

Patriotic Holidays

Five of our nationally observed holidays are Memorial Day (last Monday in May), Independence Day (July 4), Labor Day (first Monday in September), Veterans Day (November 11), and Columbus Day (second Monday in October). These holidays are known by other names, some of which are days celebrated in other countries on the same dates as their American counterparts. Use the following clues to match the two names for each holiday.

Clues:

1. The day that marks the anniversary of America’s birthdate is neither Veterans Day nor Columbus Day.
2. The holiday that honors American veterans who fought or lost their lives in wars is not known as the Eight-Hour Day.
3. The Spanish holiday, translated “Day of the Roses,” honors the Hispanic heritage of the Latin-American people. The American counterpart of this holiday was named after an explorer for Spain.
4. The two holidays that are celebrated on the same dates every year are neither the Eight-Hour Day nor Decoration Day.
5. Armistice Day and the Eight-Hour Day are celebrated in the fall season of the year.

Presidents

- ◆ George Washington was the first president of the United States. He was from the state of Virginia and resided in beautiful Mt. Vernon.
- ◆ Thomas Jefferson was the third president of the United States. He was from the state of Virginia and built his beautiful home, Monticello, there.
- ◆ Andrew Jackson was the seventh president of the United States. He was born in South Carolina, but he retired to his beautiful Hermitage in Nashville, Tennessee.
- ◆ Abraham Lincoln was the 16th president of the United States. He was born in Kentucky, but he later moved to Indiana.



Please match these presidents with their nicknames, their wives, and the wars in which they participated.

Clues:

1. The two earliest presidents had wives with the same first name, came from the same state, and were key figures in the same war.
2. Rachel Donelson Robards was still married to Captain Robards when she married “Old Hickory,” though she thought she was divorced. Her husband fought in a war that took place in the early 19th century.
3. The most recent of these presidents participated in the American Civil War, and he was not known as the “Father of Our Country.”
4. The “Sage of Monticello,” also referred to as the “Man of the People,” was a lawyer, inventor, architect, draftsman of the Declaration of Independence, and a patriot of the American Revolution.
5. Martha Skelton was not married to the “Father of Our Country,” nor did her husband fight in the War of 1812.

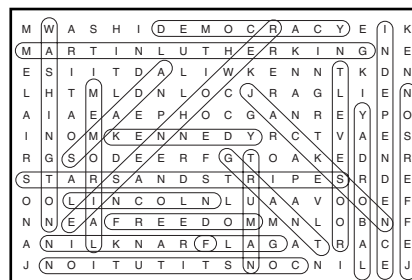
