
Thanksgiving Dinner


Creating a Thanksgiving Day

Thanksgiving Day has not always been a holiday. Certain people initiated certain times to establish such a day, but the day has changed over the years. Use the following clues to help you decide which people initiated a certain day to celebrate Thanksgiving Day.

Clues:

- 1. The 16th president of the United States first declared the last Thursday of November as an official day, saying it was "a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father."
- 2. The editor of *Godey's Lady's Book* promoted the idea of a National Thanksgiving Day. Her ideas influenced the president mentioned above.
- 3. The president who was a victim of polio and the initiator of the New Deal established the next-to-last Thursday of November as Thanksgiving. This helped businesses by lengthening the shopping period before Christmas.
- 4. The president with wooden teeth did not establish the fourth Thursday nor the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

5. The legislative branch of the government declared Thanksgiving a legal federal holiday on the fourth Thursday in November.


